Bill Plante-Selma Fifty Years Later-June 25- 6 pm-3240 O Street NW

In Selma, 50 years ago as a young reporter, Bill Plante witnessed the events and the fear, the anger and the hopes those days generated. He recalls Bloody Sunday and Dr. King's prediction following his March to Montgomery that segregation was on its deathbed in America. Five months later, Congress passed the Voting Rights Bill. However, 50 years later segregation hasn't died yet. It still exists-in economic inequality, criminal justice and when the right to vote is challenged. The demonstrations were a game changer, but they were not the finish line. Join Bill Plante for a fascinating discussion of Selma 50 years later. The presentation will include short video clips from Selma and the Civil Rights era as well.

Bill Plante has been a CBS News White House correspondent during the administrations of Presidents Regan, Clinton, George W. Bush and Obama. He has received many major broadcast journalism awards. Bill Plante served as anchor of the CBS Sunday Night News from 1988 to 1995. Bill Plante's reports are seen regularly on "CBS This Morning", where he is Senior White House Correspondent and the "CBS Evening News with Scott Pelley". Bill Plante and his wife, Robin Smith, are also founding members of Georgetown Village.

Book Discussion-The Boys in the Boat, June 15-10:30-3143 O St.

Daniel James Brown's book tells the story of the University of Washington's 1936 eight-oar crew and their epic quest for an Olympic gold medal, a team that transformed the sport and grabbed the attention of millions of Americans. The sons of loggers, shipyard workers, and farmers, the boys defeated elite rivals first from eastern and British universities and finally the German crew rowing for Adolf Hitler in the Olympic Games in Berlin, 1936. Based on the boys' own diaries and journals, the book is an irresistible story about beating the odds and finding hope in the most desperate of times.
