Book Discussion-The Devil in the White City Wednesday, September 9 10:15 am

Author Erik Larson imbues the incredible events surrounding the 1893 Chicago World's Fair with such drama that readers may find themselves checking the book's categorization to be sure that *The Devil in the White City* is not, in fact, a highly imaginative novel. Larson tells the stories of two men: Daniel H. Burnham, the architect responsible for the fair's construction, and H.H. Holmes, a serial killer masquerading as a charming doctor. Burnham's challenge was immense. In a short period of time, he was forced to overcome the death of his partner and numerous other obstacles to construct the famous "White City" around which the fair was built. His efforts to complete the project, and the fair's incredible success, are skillfully related along with entertaining appearances by such notables as Buffalo Bill Cody, Susan B. Anthony, and Thomas Edison. This book was very well-reviewed when it came out, and currently a movie is being made based on this true story. Our October book will be <u>My Brilliant Friend</u> by Elena Ferrante. Described as 'A modern masterpiece from one of Italy's most acclaimed authors, *My Brilliant Friend* is a rich, intense, and generoushearted story about two friends, Elena and Lila. Ferrante's inimitable style lends itself perfectly to a meticulous portrait of these two women that is also the story of a nation and a touching meditation on the nature of friendship.

The story begins in the 1950s, in a poor but vibrant neighborhood on the outskirts of Naples. Growing up on these tough streets the two girls learn to rely on each other ahead of anyone or anything else. As they grow, as their paths repeatedly diverge and converge, Elena and Lila remain best friends whose respective destinies are reflected and refracted in the other. They are likewise the embodiments of a nation undergoing momentous change. Through the lives of these two women, Ferrante tells the story of a neighborhood, a city, and a country as it is transformed in ways that, in turn, also transform the relationship between her protagonists, the unforgettable Elena and Lila. Private Tour of Lincoln's Cottage for GV Members Sept. 25 11am

President Lincoln developed the Emancipation Proclamation while living in a Gothic Revival Cottage at the Soldiers' Home in Washington, DC. Lincoln's time at the Cottage served as bookends for Civil War — he first visited the grounds three days after his inauguration and last rode out to the site the day before his assassination. While living at the Cottage for 13 months from June-November of 1862-1864, Lincoln regularly commuted to the White House. The Cottage opened to the public in 2008, and is run by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, a private, non-profit organization, through an agreement with the Armed Forces Retirement Home.

If you have never visited Lincoln's Cottage join us for a special interactive tour that will have you thinking about Lincoln's time and accomplishments in a new way. Cost of the tour is \$13.00 a person, and you must RSVP to GV office by 9/11. The cottage is located on the Armed Forces Retirement Home Campus, street address is 140 Rock Creek Church Road NW, Washington DC 20011. We will arrange carpools once you sign up-there is free parking on site.
