Jonathan Russin-<u>Christmas in Tanganyika</u>-October 5 at 5:30 pm-3240 O Street

Jonathan Russin will be talking about his book <u>Christmas in Tanganyika</u>. Jonathan wrote this memoir about his experiences in 1961 when he took a year off from law school to take part in a one-year assignment as a research assistant to the Dean of the Law Faculty at the new University of East Africa. During the Christmas/New Year recess, Russin volunteered with the Home Ministry to assist with a program to aid refugees from the Hutu-Tutsi conflict in Ruanda—which became Rwanda in 1962 upon gaining independence. The book was written upon Jonathan's return from the refugee camp and the story is as fresh today as it was more than fifty years ago.

It is a story of reaching out to help others; it is a story of perseverance, it is a story of hope. Join us to see pictures and hear Jonathan talk about his experiences and answer questions. Wine and light refreshments will be served, please RSVP if possible so we are sure to have enough.
