Dear Members, Volunteers and Friends,

The lazy days of summer are approaching, but Georgetown Village staff and volunteers won't be relaxing at the beach. Georgetown Village will continue to offer its many services and activities throughout July and August so take a look at the listing below and on page 4 to update your calendar. Young Volunteers Helping Seniors



In today's world, as many seniors have moved into retirement communities or live far from their families, there are fewer opportunities for younger people and seniors to come together. Thanks to some of our younger volunteers, starting with middle school on up into young adulthood, Georgetown Village members are fortunate to benefit from this intergenerational coming together.

Currently, our student volunteers come from Holy Trinity, Georgetown Visitation, and the Washington International School. Some have been recruited through personal contacts, and in other cases, the parents of teenage children have contacted the Village to learn more about student volunteering believing it important that their children learn the value of helping others, many of whom may be their neighbors, while also fulfilling their schools' community service requirements. All Georgetown Village volunteers, including the younger ones, are vetted and undergo training.

What kinds of services are youthful volunteers able to provide? More than you might think. In addition to dog walking and caring for pets, yard work assistance, snow shoveling in the winter and keeping an eye on your home while you are away (picking up papers and flyers from the doorstep), there are other possible services that one might not have thought of such as: helping a member to set up WiFi, new electronics, TV's, printers, laptops, iPads, cell phones and email, or introducing them to the world of social media, Facebook, Instagram, etc.; also, making holiday cards online, electronic photo albums, downloading photos; and during the holiday season, putting up and taking down holiday decorations (who wouldn't love that!).

Fortunately, many of our teenage volunteers will be around this summer, so if you have been thinking about projects that could benefit from some youthful assistance, do give the Village a call!

Caroline Ramsay Merriam



Georgetown Village members have extraordinary stories and Caroline Ramsay Merriam is no exception. Describing herself as a "caricature of a liberal, straight out of Central Casting", her working life has revolved around Civil Rights and community development, both nationally and internationally. In 1962 she worked for the nascent Peace Corps before moving to the Civil Rights Commission. Hospitalized in August 1963, she was determined to participate in the March on Washington to hear Dr. Martin Luther King speak. She hid in a laundry cart and escaped onto 23rd Street. Her doctor was furious but she was jubilant. She was actively involved in getting Senators and Representatives to vote for the 1964 Civil Rights Bill and then found herself in Alabama and Mississippi attending hearings by the States' Advisory Committees.

in 1968 she began working for the Office of Economic Opportunity which led to a life-long passion for craft cooperatives and grassroots communities. She helped found cooperatives from Alaska to Alabama, reconnecting in the latter with many of her former Civil Rights friends. She also organized the annual Christmas Opportunities Boutique for the OEO, creating a market for crafts made by low-income cooperatives.

Caroline set up her own foundation in 1981, the Crafts Center, a non-profit that worked with many international agencies to improve the lives of the world's poor. Eschewing top down management, she encouraged cooperatives to make decisions for themselves but helped locate local technical assistance and micro financing possibilities. Her work took her as far as Africa and Australia. She encouraged peer-to-peer connections, at one point putting Hmong refugee cooperatives in touch with those run by Native Americans so they could learn from the latter's experiences.

Not one to slow down, Caroline now runs the Ramsay Merriam Fund. She continues to care deeply about the world's poor but has expanded her focus to include child labor and human trafficking. She is also an ardent supporter of prison reform, especially with regard to solitary confinement. A liberal to the core!

Meet Volunteer Jim Smith



Georgetown Village is truly fortunate that the position of Treasurer currently rests in the capable hands of Jim Smith. Originally from the mid-west, a 34-year career with Bell/AT&T eventually brought him to DC to run their Regulatory Affairs Office. Now retired, Jim spends many hours a week ensuring that the Village is fiscally sound. Working with the Village's outside accountants, preparing information for tax returns, dealing with insurance, ensuring there is money in the bank and that it is wisely invested are just a few of his responsibilities. It could be a full-time job.

But Jim's involvement with the Village is much wider and he also volunteers on a more practical level. Seeing his own parents' needs change as they grew older he realized the same needs existed in his local community. He is a very competent handy-man and approached Lynn Golub-Rofrano to offer his services. Many of our members have been the lucky beneficiaries. Jim has done everything from changing lightbulbs and repairing toilets to helping a member buy and install a new kitchen cabinet. He also re-discovered the skill of mowing a lawn with an old-fashioned push-mower, something he last did as a teenager.

Dealing with medical bills and coping with an influx of mail can be a daunting task, especially if a late partner has formerly taken care of it. Jim regularly meets with some members to help with these complexities. He never gives financial advice but says it is a comfort to members to talk to someone from the Village that they trust. He helps with IT problems too, although he is modest about his skills. As he says, there are so many ways one can volunteer.

When not helping the Village, Jim likes to play golf and is also involved with covenant control in his neighborhood. One wonders where he finds the time.
