#### Chat With Isabel Sawhill January 14th 1pm-3pm 3150 South Street NW

This month's Chat With speaker is long-time GV member Isabel Sawhill, senior fellow at The Brookings Institute. Isabel will be discussing her latest book, Generation Unbound: Drifting Into Sex and Parenthood Without Marriage.

Isabel V. Sawhill is a senior fellow in Economic Studies at the Brookings Institution. She served as vice president and director of the Economic Studies program from 2003 to 2006. She has been a codirector with Ron Haskins of the Center on Children and Families. Prior to joining Brookings, Dr. Sawhill was a senior fellow at The Urban Institute. She served in the Clinton Administration as an Associate Director of OMB, where her responsibilities included all of the human resource programs of the federal government, accounting for one third of the federal budget. Her research has spanned a wide array of economic and social issues, including fiscal policy, economic growth, poverty and inequality. Over the past decade, her major focus has been on how to improve opportunities for disadvantaged children in the U.S.

This member-only program offers you the opportunity to interact with Dr. Sawhill in an intimate setting, share your thoughts and hear her ideas. Attendance is limited to the first 20 people who sign up, if you are interested in attending get in your reservation early.

### The Sympathizer –January 15 -10:30 am-3139 N Street NW

This month's book is a best-selling novel and recipient of the 2016 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction. Set as the flashback in a coerced confession of a political prisoner, the book tells the story of the South Vietnamese Government in 1975 and subsequent events in American exile in Los Angeles, through the eyes of a half-Vietnamese, half-French undercover communist agent. The spy remains unnamed throughout the novel from the fall of Saigon, to refugee camps and relocation in Los Angeles, to his time as a film consultant in the Philippines, and finally to his return and subsequent imprisonment in Vietnam. A Vietnamese reviewer noted that, finally, Americans have a chance to gain a new perspective on the war, one that is in contrast to the one provided by Hollywood myth-makers.
